Ms. Cain shares her compelling story of strength and hope by relating her struggles to overcome childhood abuse and its effects.

### **COLLATERAL DAMAGE IN THE MEMORY WARS - AVOIDING HARM TO INNOCENTS** –

Uncovering a confidential case report subject's identity, the subject's reactions and suggestions for the ethical review of case reports.

Following the 1997 publication of the Child Maltreatment article entitled "Videotaped Discovery of a Reportedly Unrecallable Memory of Child Sexual Abuse: Comparison with a Childhood Interview Videotaped 11 Years Before," Elizabeth Loftus, Melvin Guyer and a private investigator determined Jane's identity, proceeded to interview some of her family members and others close to her, tried to contact Jane at a friend's home and then published two articles in the Skeptical Inquirer challenging the validity of her initial allegations. Jane Doe filed ethics complaints with the authors' Universities and ultimately sued for damages. Dave Corwin will summarize the case report and show a brief clip of Jane's discovered memory. Jane will describe the impact of this intrusion upon her life and her reasons for filing the ethics complaints and lawsuit. Frank Putnam will suggest some ethical guidelines for review of case report data.

# David L. Chadwick 14<sup>th</sup> Annual Endowed Lecture Series

**David L. Chadwick, MD**, has been a national leader in the fight to prevent child abuse. He recognized the rights of children and provided clinical leadership for over 45 years. His retirement from Children's Hospital and the Center for Child Protection in 1996 marked the end of an era. He was instrumental in developing the first model Child Abuse Reporting Law for the United States. He is a founding member of the San Diego Child Abuse Coordinating Council, a multi-disciplinary community team.

During his tenure as the Medical Director of Children's Hospital-San Diego, Dr. Chadwick began the hospital's first child abuse program in 1974. He left the hospital medical director position in 1985 to devote his time and energies to enhance efforts in the prevention, diagnosis, research and treatment of all forms of child abuse and neglect. It is through his expertise that the Chadwick Center, formerly known as the Center for Child Protection, has become one of the largest and most comprehensive hospital-based programs in the United States.

Dr. Chadwick is the author and co-author of a multitude of peer reviewed articles dealing with a wide range of pediatric subjects as well as child abuse. He is the author of the "Child Abuse" chapter in the textbook, *Pediatrics*, 18<sup>th</sup> edition, edited by Abraham M. Rudolph. He lectures widely on child abuse to a variety of audiences and appears frequently in court as an expert witness in child abuse cases. Dr. Chadwick continues, as the Director Emeritus of the Chadwick Center, to devote considerable effort to pursuing the elimination of child abuse and family violence. His contributions over the course of his long career are reflected in every area of the field of child maltreatment.

# William Friedrich, PhD., ABPP

**B**ill Friedrich was a Professor and Consultant in the Department of Psychiatry and Psychology at the Mayo Clinic and Mayo Medical School in Rochester, MN. He received his undergraduate degree from Texas Lutheran in 1974, his MPH from UTSPH in 1975, and his Ph.D. from the University of North Dakota in 1980. He authored several books on the treatment of sexually abused children and published numerous articles and chapters on the evaluation and treatment of maltreated children and their parents.

He was the developer of the Child Sexual Behavior Inventory published by PAR ([www.parinc.com](http://www.parinc.com)). Sage published his most recent book, "Psychological Assessment of Sexually Abused Children and their Families" in 2001. He was a Diplomat with the American Board of Professional Psychology in both Clinical and Family Psychology. He received an Outstanding Career Research Award by APSAC in 2001.

Dr. Friedrich was a frequent lecturer at the San Diego Conference on Child and Family Maltreatment and a genuinely nice person who cared passionately about children. His interest in those around him and his unassuming manner defined his special character. He was a friend and colleague to many of us around the nation and throughout the world.

Dr. Friedrich passed away September 26, 2005. He is profoundly missed.
