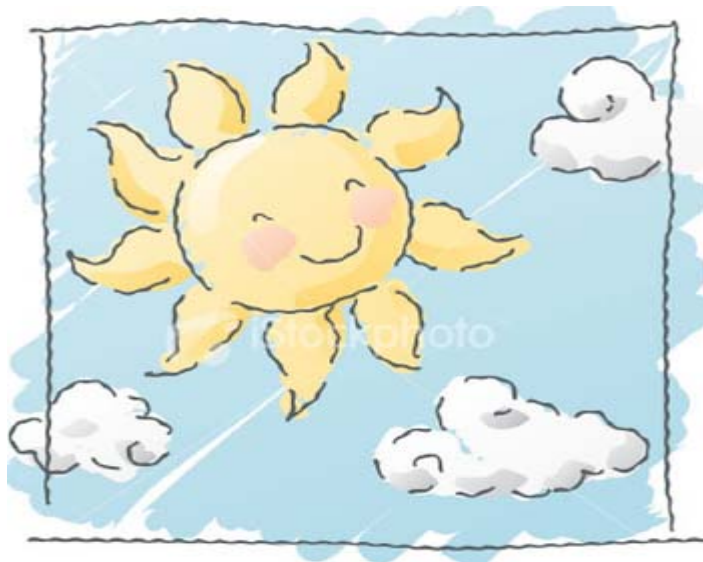

The purpose of the Child Abuse Investigation training program is to provide participants with the knowledge, understanding, investigative techniques and resources necessary to respond effectively to the unique challenges encountered in family and caregiver child abuse cases.

Targeted audience is law enforcement, child protective services and other juvenile justice system professionals involved in the investigation of child abuse, exploitation and missing children.

A week of specialized training runs concurrently during the San Diego Conference. Participants, who choose this training, must attend the entire 5-day CAI program of 36 hours. After each daily session is over, attendees are encouraged to go to conference evening workshops and special events.

ADVANCED FORENSIC INTERVIEWING TECHNIQUES FOR CHILDREN: THE COGNITIVE INTERVIEW AND BEYOND

This is an **advanced level** day and a half forensic interviewing institute with an emphasis on increasing interviewer skills in the area of obtaining detailed narratives from children through the use of the cognitive interview. Obtaining such narrative detail from children allows investigative agents to pursue evidence to either support or refute allegations of child sexual abuse. This 12-hour session will include both lecture and practice interview sessions to develop and refine this skill. Research support for this technique will be discussed, along with benefits and criticisms from a legal perspective. In addition, the presenters will discuss interviewing reluctant children and engage in a dialogue about how to conduct peer review and give feedback on interviews using a standardized tool. It is recommended that participants have completed a week long interview training, such as APSAC, Finding Words, NCAC, The Childhood Trust, or state recognized model, to fully benefit from this learning experience.

ADVANCED SEXUAL ABUSE EVALUATION FOR MEDICAL PROVIDERS

This advanced course will provide the literature basis for current recommendations and guidelines for medical evaluation of sexually abused children and adolescents. Difficult cases including the most common mimics of sexual abuse update on sexually transmitted infections. Also, included will be new technologies in photo documentation, and how to be a reviewer or be reviewed in the context of CQI. Case presentations for the last hour will be elicited from attendees although the presenters will have cases to present. Cases must have excellent photo documentation which will also be critiqued as part of the process.

This session will build upon the California Clinical Medical Training Center course offered Sunday January 24. That course should be registered for separately through the Chadwick Center. It is STRONGLY recommended that new or inexperienced medical providers attend the CCFMTC course prior to this APSAC Preconference Institute.

MEDICAL ISSUES IN CHILD MALTREATMENT FOR THE NON-MEDICAL TEAM MEMBER

Designed to address medical issues for the non-medical multi-disciplinary team member (CPS, Law Enforcement, Attorneys, etc.), this session describes the role and responsibilities of the medical provider and medical issues, terminology and diagnosis as it relates to the investigation and prosecution of child abuse/neglect. Topics include:

- *Role of the Medical Provider in Child Abuse Cases* - An introduction to understanding the role of the child abuse medical consultant;
- *Abusive Head Trauma (AHT)*: A Review of current medical and scientific issues regarding AHT in children;
- *Cutaneous Injuries*: A primer on the recognition and medical evaluation of skin injuries;
- *Fractures and Brittle Bones*: When are fractures concerning? When is metabolic bone disease a concern;
- *Child Sexual Abuse*: A look at standards for the medical care of sexual abuse victims, current research on genital findings and evidentiary issues.

Review the basics of developing CACs – child-focused, facility-based community programs - in which representatives from law enforcement, child protective services, prosecution, victim advocacy, and medical and mental health communities jointly intervene in child maltreatment cases. Topics include partner agency buy-in and participation, multidisciplinary team composition, protocol development, facility acquisition and design, personnel needs, budgeting, and standards of operation. Participants will have an opportunity to consult with the presenters in order to tailor strategies to fit their communities and to form mentoring relationships.

Trauma through the Eyes of Infants and Young Children will provide information and training on infant mental health, the effects of trauma on young children and their parents or caregivers, and the importance of a relationship perspective for understanding and helping young children.

The presenters, from the University of California, San Francisco and Louisiana State University, will describe and use video illustrations showing the importance of relationship based evaluations, child-parent psychotherapy, and different intervention and treatment strategies for understanding young children in the context of their relationships and environment.

Cultural issues and the need for cultural sensitivity in working with young children and their families will be discussed and illustrated through case material.

The presenters will also discuss the risk for vicarious traumatization with exposure to trauma and work with high risk young children and the need for reflective supervision to help support those who do this important work.
